After mandatory leave, Homicide Detective Kes Morris is back. She's assigned to a missing persons case by personal request and direct order of her new captain. Discretion required. A new series of beautiful bind-ups with cover illustrations by Briana Corr Scott brings readers affordable collectors' editions of the beloved Anne of Green Gables novels.

With a beautiful new cover by celebrated illustrator Briana Corr Scott, Lucy Maud Montgomery's classic third and fourth books in the Anne of Green Gables series, *Anne of the Island* and *Anne of Windy Poplars*, are available together as the second book in a series of gorgeous new bind-up editions.

In the third installment of the Anne of Green Gables series, Anne Shirley heads for Redmond College, leaving behind her rural life in Avonlea for the city of Kingsport. There she must deal with an unfortunate marriage proposal, the beginning of her writing career, and the sudden attention of Gilbert Blythe. Is Anne ready for true love?

In the fourth book, Anne begins a new career and faces a new challenge: the "royal family" of Summerside, the Pringles. Apparently she's not their preferred choice as principal of Summerside High. But she quickly finds friends at Windy Poplars and learns the secrets of her new-found home, triumphing as always.

Lucy Maud (L. M.) Montgomery, one of Canada's best-known authors, was born in Prince Edward Island in 1874. Her career spanned fifty years and included twenty-one novels, over five hundred stories, over five hundred poems, many essays and articles, as well as volumes of journals and letters. But it is her first novel, *Anne of Green Gables* (1908), that is her best-loved work, not only in Canada but all over the world.

A powerful work of contemporary literary fiction set in Cape Breton and Scotland exploring the clandestinity of queer abuse from the Thomas Raddall Award—shortlisted author of *Crocuses Hatch from Snow.*

Sorcha is over the hook-ups and gay haunts of her twenties. At thirty-one what she wants, more than anything, is to have a baby. Then she meets Chris—with her buttoned-up plaid, 90s heartthrob hair, and grand romantic gestures—and things get serious. Fast. Though Sorcha's friends find her new partner problematic, Sorcha has an explanation for everything.

As Chris's moods turn volatile and Sorcha becomes increasingly isolated, Chris paints an idyllic picture of domestic bliss in Cape Breton. Sorcha is all in: if her conservative religious upbringing taught her anything, it's how to save. Plus, Chris promises Sorcha the thing she wants most—a baby.

But when Sorcha becomes pregnant and Chris's abuse escalates, Sorcha realizes she must escape the life they've built together, just as she escaped her own stifling family years before.

When Sorcha's estranged Aunt Agnes, a retired midwife, messages Sorcha out of the blue, her bothy in the Scottish Highlands seems the perfect place to hide. As the bundle of cells in Sorcha's belly diligently divides, she daydreams that Agnes will deliver the baby and they'll stay in Scotland, where Chris can't find them. And where, just maybe, Sorcha could build the sort of family she's always ached for.

Exploring the clandestinity of queer abuse, the fierceness of friendship, and the magic of found family, *milktooth* is a bold, inventive, lyrical and darkly funny story about finding the strength to cut away what's harmed you and create something entirely new.

Jaime Burnet writes fiction, plays music, practices labour and human rights law, and lives with her family by the ocean in Mulipjikejk/Herring Cove, Mi'kma'ki/Nova Scotia. Her first novel, *Crocuses Hatch from Snow.* was shortlisted for the Thomas Raddall Atlantic Fiction Award and the ReLit Award.



Toward Prosperity

The Transformation of Atlantic Canada's Economy

A comprehensive analysis of the economic challenges and opportunities in Atlantic Canada and a blueprint for future growth, from a leading social scientist and economist.

Atlantic Canada has long been seen as a "have-not" region in terms of economic performance. Many factors have played into this underperformance: stagnation in population growth, chronic unemployment, an aging population, a high number of people living in rural communities, and an overdependence on government.

But that story is changing. New opportunities are emerging in areas such as natural resources—especially in light of the federal government's goal of net zero by 2050. Post-secondary education has been playing a significant role in immigrant attraction, a key factor in the region's economic prosperity, especially in smaller urban communities. Incubators and accelerators have led to a vibrant start-up community and the re-emergence of a strong entrepreneurial environment in Atlantic Canada.

Opportunities now exist for Atlantic Canada to become a leader in the green economy through new energy alternatives including tidal power, wind power, green hydrogen, and small modular reactors. Successful economic clusters, including the PEI Bio-Alliance and Canada's Ocean Supercluster, are driving significant growth in Atlantic Canada.

In Toward Prosperity, social scientist Don Mills and economist David Campbell (co-hosts of the *Insights* podcast) examine, with the aid of numerous explanatory graphics and visuals, the economic transformation that is currently under way in Atlantic Canada and provide a blueprint for sustaining that momentum in the long term.


Don Mills is president of Crane Cove Holdings, his family investment firm, and a partner and director with CABCO Communications. He is the co-founder and former owner and CEO of Corporate Research Associates (now Narrative Research), which he sold in late 2018. He remained Chair and Senior Counsel until early 2023. He is a regular columnist with both the Saltwire Network and Brunswick News and a frequent media commentator on public affairs issues. He is also the co-host of the *Insights* podcast on the Acadia Broadcasting Network. He continues to be active as a consultant in marketing and strategy.

David Campbell is the president of Jupia Consultants Inc., an economic development consulting firm based in New Brunswick. He has more than 30 years' experience working with industry, not-for-profit organizations, and governments across Canada on economic development strategic planning, economic impact analysis, workforce development, and sector development. He was previously Chief Economist with the government of New Brunswick. In that role, he led the development of economic policy and economic development strategy for the provincial government. David is a writer, a podcaster, and a columnist with Postmedia.



Steeped in mystery and raw beauty, McNabs Island—situated in the middle of Halifax Harbour—yearns to yield up its history. Decaying estate homes and weathered road signs are all that remain of the once-vibrant farms and businesses that populated the island.


Many things have been written about McNabs Island, but little about the residents who lived there from the 1920s through the 1970s. This collection of stories—dictated to author Bruce Scott by his mother, who grew up on the island—provides a singular and highly personal perspective on the island's history.

The Last Farm on McNabs will introduce you to Scott's great-uncle, Arthur Davis, and his bottle works and fairgrounds; Bill Lynch, the man who managed the Findlay fairgrounds; and Joseph Perrin, owner of the historically prominent Hugonin Estate—whose life on the island prompted many fascinating tales.


Through recollections from one of the last surviving family members, and with 40 photos and fascinating hand-drawn maps, *The Last Farm on McNabs* will take readers on an illuminating journey into the lives of the last family to farm the island.

Bruce Scott was born in Nova Scotia and spent his childhood summers on McNabs Island, where his grandparents farmed and his mother was born. Years of adventure and exploration fostered a creative bent, as expressed through this island chronicle, his first book. It is his hope that the stories of his family and their interactions with notable families on the island will unravel some mysteries for true lovers of McNabs Island.



The Untold Story of Nova Scotia's Pioneers of Peace and Suffrage

The never-before-told story of mother and daughter peace activists and suffragettes in 19th- and 20th-century Nova Scotia and beyond.

Mary Chesley was born in 1847 in Dartmouth, NS, and lived her adult years in Lunenburg. A descendent of Quakers and a major figure in the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, Chesley worked tirelessly to ensure women voted. She also maintained an unwavering passion for the cause of peace. Her writings reveal a passionate, intelligent, and highly serious yet witty advocate of suffrage and peace with a keen understanding of political and social issues.


Her daughter Polly—herself highly intelligent and fiercely independent—would graduate from the London School of Economics and the Sorbonne, becoming an outspoken activist who was heavily involved with pacifist and leftist political and social groups in London in the 1920s. In 1934, Polly travelled to India to work toward the cause of Indian independence from colonial rule, where she developed a close personal relationship with Mahatma Gandhi.

In their day, both mother and daughter held prominence in activist causes, yet—primarily because they were women—they have largely disappeared from the historical record. Featuring twenty never-before-seen black-and-white images, *Disruptive Women* is not only their story but also the story of Sharon M. H. MacDonald's meticulous sleuthing to track down and bring to light these noteworthy forgotten figures.

Sharon M. H. MacDonald is a founding member and former Chair of the Halifax Women's History Society (now the Nova Scotia Women's History Society). She is the co-author of the book *Old Nova Scotian Quilts* and a co-founder of the Nova Scotia Heritage Quilt Project. Her MA thesis, "Hidden Costs, Hidden Labours: Women in Nova Scotia during Two World Wars," explored the relief work of women volunteers. She has published book chapters and articles in journals and continues to research, write, and publicly present women's history, particularly focussing on early peace activism in Nova Scotia and women's organizational and material culture.

For author Steve Skafte, *This River Was Once a Road* represents a decade of incessant adventures—ten years of trawling through old maps and property records, searching for the secrets that Nova Scotia's abandoned roads—all still public rights-of-way, open for all to use—have been keeping from "ordinary folks" like him.

In that time, he's explored countless overgrown fields where he's discovered rock walls, old wells, foundations, and signs of former human habitation. For Skafte, each of these roads inhabits a time and place lost; a track through the wilderness to a place that someone once called home.


Featuring 80 evocative colour images, with GPS coordinates to guide readers to each unique location, and more than 20 deeply poetic tales of discovery, *This River Was Once a Road* traces the paths of our past to reveal the places we've left behind.

Steve Skafte is a writer and photographer from Bridgetown, Nova Scotia, where he's lived all his life. Since he turned twenty in 2007, he's kept and shared an uninterrupted daily journal online, with stories and adventures from all over the wilds of the province—and how it felt to be there. Much of his time is wrapped up in finding forgotten human history that has been left behind in the woods. He is also the author of *The Dead Die Twice*.





Baby Smiles started as a project by the five First Nations communities in Unama'ki (Cape Breton Island, NS) through the **Tui'kn Partnership.** Tui'kn means "passage" in the Mi'kmaq language. For over twenty years, Eskasoni, Membertou, Potlotek, Wagmatcook, and Waycobah First Nations have worked together to bring a new way of thinking about health and the delivery of health services to their communities. The book was written with support from collaborators in the Faculties of Dentistry and Health at Dalhousie University, and the project has since grown to include all thirteen communities across Nova Scotia, through Tajikeimik.

Tajikeimik is the new and developing health and wellness organization leading health transformation for Mi'kmaq of Nova Scotia. Through health transformation, Mi'kmaq of Nova Scotia are taking control of the design and delivery of their health and wellness services, with the goal of improving overall health for individuals and communities.



Along with being privileged to serve a two-year term as Chief in her community, Theresa also spent many years working as an Indigenous Educator & Advisor, and continues to be a Knowledge Sharer. She presently operates an online craft business called Mi'kma'ki Craft Supplies, and is the author of four published children's books. She is a wife, mother of three, and grandmother of four.

Zeta Paul is a L'nu/Mi'kmaw illustrator and interdisciplinary artist. Born and raised in Nova Scotia, Canada. Zeta works with mediums such as illustration, graphic design, animation, print, textile art, and photography. The inspiration for her artwork revolves around memories, community, nostalgia, intimacy, and emotion. Communicated through subject matter arranged in oddly satisfying compositions, Zeta believes art can change lives, as it did for hers, and hopes her artwork inspires Indigenous kids/folks to pursue their passions and express their feelings in a positive and productive way. Jacqueline Halsey lives with her husband, Ray, and rescue cat, Piper, in a ninety-year-old house overlooking Halifax Harbour. 



As David settles on Rockbound, relationships bloom and lifelong ties are formed, whether he likes it or not. Juggling backbreaking work with raising a child, wily politics, love, and loss, David navigates the cruel tides of life that seem to plaque islanders more than anyone.

Like the merciless seas of the Atlantic, *Rockbound* is haunting and beautiful—the ghost of a time and place long gone.

Frank Parker Day was an author, athlete, and academic born in Shubenacadie, Nova Scotia, in 1881. He grew up in various coastal Nova Scotian towns, and attended Oxford University on a Rhodes scholarship. Day served the Canadian Army in WWI, wrote for *Harper's Magazine* and *Atlantic Monthly*, and taught English at the University of New Brunswick and Union College in Schenectady, New York. *Rockbound*, which won Canada Reads in 2005, is widely considered Day's best work.

The Colored Hockey League of the Maritimes was formed in 1895 in Halifax, Nova Scotia, twenty-five years before the Negro baseball leagues in the United States, and twenty-two years before the birth of the National Hockey League. The Colored league would emerge as a premier force in Canadian hockey and supply the resilience necessary to preserve a unique culture that exists to this day. Unfortunately the league's contributions were conveniently ignored, or simply stolen, as white teams and hockey officials appropriated elements of the Black players' style or sought to take credit for Black hockey innovations.

This revised and expanded twentieth-anniversary edition of *Black Ice* remains the only book ever written on the history of the Colored Hockey League. A powerful read, this edition features newly uncovered research and historic documentation on the history of the Colored Hockey League, Black hockey from the 1920s through to the mid-1950s, as well as previously undocumented efforts to create a professional Black hockey team to compete for the Stanley Cup.



Nowadays hundreds of unidentified photos tend to pile up in our computers and telephones. This book on the Acadians of Prince Edward Island shows the cultural and historical importance of carefully documented and organized collections of photos. From some points of view this book is like an old-fashioned family album, except that it illustrates the ordinary life of not just one but many Acadian families. In most cases the photos are informal snapshots taken by Acadians themselves over a time period stretching from the late 1800s to the 1960s. All these snapshots take us back to the olden days of large families and subsistence farming when the church was the centre of village life. Georges Arsenault has created a fascinating portrait of Island Acadians of yesteryear.

Georges Arsenault is a prominent Acadian historian and folklorist who has been writing about the Acadians of Prince Edward Island since the early 1980s. His landmark book, *Les Acadiens de l'Île*, 1720-1980, won both the Champlain and France-Acadie prizes. In 2002, he wrote *Acadian Legends, Folktales and Songs from Prince Edward Island*, and with the publication of *Acadian Christmas Traditions* in 2007, he expanded his research to include Acadian traditions throughout Eastern Canada. The original French version of this book, *La Mi-Carême en Acadie*, received the 2008 Prince Edward Island Book Award

In May of 2020, Canada was in the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic. In the Cameron and Simmins household, other serious health concerns had arisen. By June, author, journalist, and filmmaker Silver Donald Cameron had died, leaving behind a devastated – and entirely isolated – widow, Marjorie Simmins. With no family for thousands of kilometres and a bubble of only two friends in her Cape Breton village, Simmins soon discovered that she had to keep busy or despair would set in. She would also find support and love all around her, whether it arrived from up the road in her seaside village or across the country in Vancouver on the West Coast.

"People will help you," Silver Donald had said to her that last week of his life — and he was right. Filled with a mix of emotions, from deepest grief to the giddiest of misadventures, *In Search of Puffins* is a story of love, loss, and reinvention. In contrast to the death that left her reeling, Simmins is determined to bring rejuvenating change to a new life on her own. The result is a story of surprises and friendship, sweetened by laughter and salted by some hard lessons in survival.

Simmins also pins her hopes on puffins, the sauciest of seabirds, to raise her heart and show her how to use her wings again. But finding puffins isn't easy. It's going to take some sleuthing to find these "clowns of the sea," who thus far in her life, no matter what Silver Donald used to say, have remained hidden from her. In Search of Puffins is the third book in a series of memoirs, including *Coastal Lives* and *Year of the Horse*.

Marjorie Simmins is an award-winning journalist and the author of five nonfiction titles. These include a trio of memoirs, *Coastal Lives, Year of the Horse*, and *In Search of Puffins*, a book on the practice of memoir, *Memoir: Conversations and Craft*, and a biography of Canadian racehorse, *Somebeachsomewhere*. Simmins teaches writing workshops around the Maritimes and across Canada, and also via Zoom. She has turned her health scare into a positive message for readers. The author has deliberately woven the theme of small versus big throughout heartwarming stories of connection and acts of kindness, some random, some deliberate. In an exclusive interview, Every Little Thing introduces us to the son of beloved and world-renowned children's author the late Richard Scarry, whose little character, Lowly Worm, was a big favourite of Janice's. *Every Little Thing* includes tributes to helpers, artisans, nurses, teachers, students, psychologists, first responders, accessibility advocates, disaster relief helpers, and volunteers. Landry takes us on a journey that proves in the end that the little things really are the big things.

Janice Landry has won three national awards for her books and mental health advocacy. Janice has been a journalist for thirty-eight years, graduating in 1987 from the University of King's College, Halifax, with Distinction in Honours Journalism. She has worn many hats since then: television reporter, producer and anchor, university instructor, magazine writer and editor, freelance video producer and script writer, social media manager and web series writer, public speaker, mental health advocate, and author.

This event set the stage for the hardening of the sectarian conflict between Protestants and Catholics on Prince Edward Island for the next 125 years.

The Belfast Riot of 1847 lays out the social and political conditions that led to the riot on the Island, introduces us to the major players on both sides, provides a detailed account of its unfolding, and takes a nuanced look at who was to blame.







He lived and worked in Charlottetown from 1978-1981, during which, he conducted research for this, his first book. 



Three generations after Chin Island was inhabited by a bustling community of laborers, only a few families remain. A feud begins on Christmas Day, troubling the remaining inhabitants when they gossip and fan the flames of conflict. Two warring factions collide as the kindly Elbridge Gilman attempts to stop them along with his quick-tempered partner, Liseo MacGimsey. *Speak to the Winds*, originally published in 1956, remains a classic that still draws glowing reviews.

Born and raised in the fishing village of Gotts Island, **Ruth Moore (1903–1989)** emerged as one of the most important Maine authors of the twentieth century, best known for her authentic portrayals of Maine people and her evocative descriptions of the state. In her time she wrote 14 novels, and was favorably compared to Faulkner, Steinbeck, Caldwell, and O'Connor. She graduated from Albany State Teacher's College and worked at a variety of jobs including personal secretary to Mary White Ovington, a founder of the NAACP, and at *Reader's Digest. The Weir*, her debut novel in 1943, was hailed by critics and established Moore as an important and popular novelist, but her second novel *Spoonhan-dle* spent fourteen weeks on The New York Times bestseller list. The novel was also made into the movie, *Deep Waters*. Moore and her partner, travelled extensively, but always resided in Maine. Moore died in Bar Harbor in 1989, leaving a nearly unmatched literary legacy.



From the marshy lands by the sea emanates a strange, disturbing story, lurking in the memory of a timeless storyteller. The story of a man and a woman expecting a child. As the woman holds her newborn son in her arms, she feels her heart leave her chest. From that moment on, she sinks into the meanders of a visceral love and gradually loses her humanity. She watches over her son like a wounded bear, while her husband watches helplessly as his wife is transformed.

Elizabeth Blanchard worked as a pharmacist for fourteen years before her interest in literature eventually led to a career change. Her short fiction has appeared in Canadian literary journals and anthologies. Member of the Board of Directors for the Frye Festival, she also co-edited *Cadence: voix féminines females voices* (2020, Frog Hollow Press) and was assistant fiction editor for *The Antigonish Review.* She won the Writer's Federation of New Brunswick literary competition for short fiction and was a 2021 finalist for the David Adams Richards Prize.

Nancy King Schofield is a poet and visual artist. She obtained a Bachelor of Fine Arts with distinction from Mount Allison University in 1991 and has since presented over a hundred art exhibitions. She won the Loomis and Toles Award for painting from Mount Allison and an award at the *Festival des arts visuels en Atlantique in Caraquet* (2001). She also won first place in the Writers' Federation of New Brunswick Writing Competition (2010). She co-founded the groups Breach House Gang (1999) and Women Who Write (2016), which consist of published writers and artists who continue to meet every month.
